eHealth in Europe: Empowering Patients and Offering Better Connected Healthcare Services

Overview

Information and communication technologies (ICT) can provide European citizens with better and cheaper tools to improve the quality and delivery of social care, health monitoring and health records. In the digital age, it is essential to facilitate access to e-health and develop user-friendly services for all citizens and health professionals.

According to the European Commission figures, the costs of health and social care will rise substantially to about 9% of EU GDP in 2050. To ensure the control of healthcare costs whilst maintaining high quality care, information and ICT have an important role to play in transforming the European and cross-border healthcare landscape. With citizens being increasingly connected, new opportunities are arising to tackle economic and social challenges faced by European healthcare services across Europe. Through telemedicine, e-monitoring and mobile health, new technologies have the potential to empower patients to take an active role in their own healthcare and to help professionals with better monitoring tools and information.

eHealth is the fastest growing of the three main healthcare sectors in Europe and its objectives are clear: improving citizens' health and access to quality healthcare through data sharing between patients, health service providers and professionals as well as through information networks and electronic health records. Legal obstacles remain, however, since privacy; confidentiality; and data protection concerns need to be addressed to ensure legal clarity for e-health and mhealth services across Europe.

The European Commission has launched several initiatives over the past years, with the Action Plan 2012-2020 being the most up to date. The second ehealth Action Plan operates in the context of Article 14 of Directive 2011/24 on the application of patients' rights in cross-border healthcare. Its main objective is to support research and innovation; promote international cooperation; improve interoperability of ehealth services and ensure a wider deployment and facilitating uptake.

This International Symposium provides a timely opportunity for practitioners and stakeholders across Europe to discuss the latest development and challenges in improving eHealth services across Europe and to gain more understanding in EU actions in the sector. Public Policy Exchange welcomes the participation of all key partners, responsible authorities and stakeholders. The symposium will support the exchange of ideas and encourage delegates to engage in thought-provoking topical debates.
